

Photo Illustration Project: Album Cover



For this project, we were tasked with designing a photo illustration, and I chose to recreate an album cover. I selected the most recent album from one of my favorite artists Mitski to redesign, titled "The Land is Inhospitable and So Are We." I was inspired by the album title to use a photo of a forest that looks barren and "inhospitable," and then I found a picture of Mitski looking distressed, and thought it tied in nicely with the "so are we".

A new tool I learned how to use in this project was how to layer textured photos and use the blending options in Photoshop, such as Color Burn and Dissolve. My biggest challenge with this assignment was incorporating a photo I had taken into the design. I struggled to find something that fits with the dreariness of the design until I saw the wilting flowers in my room. I like how the wilting flowers add to the bleak and depressing aura and that their warm color palate ties in with the red typography.



For my first 1 1/2-minute audio project, I chose to focus on Mizzou's Ellis Library. I interviewed my friend, Daphne Wilson (pictured above), as she often studies at the library and strongly recommends that other students should as well.

This whole project was new to me, and there were several learning curves I had to adjust to such as using an Irig microphone set to record the audio and Adobe Audition to edit. I think I was able to get great natural sounds that contributed to telling an interesting and compelling story.

For the second audio project, we were tasked with creating an NPR-style report. I focused on the Mark Twain Dining Hall and interviewed two students who live in the attached residence hall, John Otto (Left) and Brock Murphy (Right).


